ABOUT THE COLLEGE

Finding solutions that matter: The mission of the College of Engineering is to make people's lives better, whether it's by building earthquake-proof bridges, providing safe drinking water or using thin film technology to create more efficient solar cells. Students are given opportunities to make a difference even before they graduate, and help develop industry relationships that bring OSU's discoveries to the rest of the world.

Since its founding in 1891, the College of Engineering has graduated 30,000 engineers. Currently, it enrolls about 4,100 undergraduates and 800 graduate students yearly. There are approximately 135 faculty members.



WHAT IS UNDERGRADUATE STUDY?

Undergraduate study in the US means getting a bachelor's degree. A bachelor's degree is typically a four- or five-year program. It can be a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) or a Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.). To receive a bachelor's degree, students must:

- Complete a minimum 180 credit hours total. With an average course load of 15 units each term, a student can complete a bachelor's degree in four years of full-time study.
- Complete a sequence of courses within a major field of study, called major requirements (also known as upper division).
- Complete a sequence of courses outside your major field of study, called general education requirements, lower division or Baccalaureate Core at Oregon State.

BACCALAUREATE CORE

A degree from a US university doesn't just prepare you for a career – it prepares you for life. That means developing a well-rounded set of critical thinking, communication and problem-solving skills – the purpose of Oregon State University's Baccalaureate Core. Regardless of your major, you'll take Baccalaureate Core classes in science, arts and humanities — and you'll have a wide variety to choose from. You'll also find those skills useful as you go deeper into your major.

PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL

At Oregon State, majors in the College of Business and College of Engineering follow a professional school model. Students enter their respective colleges as pre-professionals and are accepted into the professional major once they have completed their pre-professional coursework.

Each student must meet the minimum application requirements and be admitted into the professional school. All upper-division coursework is completed while in the professional school during the junior and senior years.

Admission to the professional school is competitive. Meeting the minimum application requirements is the first step towards being accepted, but does not guarantee admittance into the program.







- Have lower GPAs than required of direct-entry students

MASTER'S PROGRAMS IN THE US

The master's degree usually takes one to three years of full-time study. There are two main types of master's degree programs: professional master's degrees and research master's degrees.

Professional master's degrees provide a specific set of skills needed to practice a particular profession and generally lead directly to employment. The MBA (Master of Business Administration) and MEng (Master of Engineering) are two examples.

Research master's degrees (M.A. or M.S.) are generally part of the progression to a Ph.D. program. They provide experience in research and scholarship and may involve writing a thesis or taking a comprehensive examination.

PH.D. PROGRAMS

Ph.D. programs train research scholars in a particular field and typically require both coursework and a major research project. It usually takes three to five years of full-time study to earn a Ph.D. Some doctoral programs include a master's degree program, with students beginning directly after they complete their bachelor's degree.

The first two years of a Ph.D. program involve classes and seminars to give students a comprehensive knowledge of an academic field. Students then take written and/or oral examinations to test their knowledge. Successful completion of the exams and approval of a research project leads to "candidacy."


The research project involves original research and, depending on the field, should take one to three years to complete. Faculty members guide and evaluate the project, but the student carries out the research independently.





GRADUATE PROGRAMS

More than 900 international students representing nearly 100 countries pursue their graduate education at Oregon State University, and each brings his or her own unique experiences, perspectives and academic goals. International students apply to and are admitted to nearly every graduate program at the university.

OSU offers more than 80 different graduate degree programs in fields such as engineering, forestry, agriculture, physical and life sciences, health-related studies, humanities, social sciences, family and consumer sciences, business and education.

APPLYING TO GRADUATE PROGRAMS

Admission decisions are based on many factors, such as the quality of the applicant's prior academic degree and record of accomplishment, statement of purpose, letters of recommendation from professors or others familiar with the applicant's academic work, performance in aptitude and achievement tests, relevant work experience, preparation in the proposed field of study and the suitability of the applicant's academic goals with the faculty's research interests.

Particularly at the graduate level, a critical consideration in the decision is whether your academic objectives can be satisfactorily fulfilled by the graduate programs at Oregon State. Admission is competitive, and meeting the minimum admission requirements does not guarantee admission. Following approval by your proposed program, the Graduate School will then determine whether the general university admission requirements have been met.

If you are interested in graduate study, review admissions requirements for the program and faculty research areas prior to applying.

WHAT IS THE GRADUATE PATHWAY PROGRAM?

The Graduate Pathway program is a pre-master's (or pre-doctoral) program that provides international students a direct path to various graduate degrees at the university. The program gives students the academic foundation, essential language skills and GMAT/GRE test preparation to successfully move on to the master's or doctoral degree.

WHO IS THE PROGRAM FOR?

The Graduate Pathway program is designed for international students who:

- Require additional preparation to be admitted directly to the Graduate School
- Fall short of meeting the minimum GPA or test score requirements
- Need further English development
- Need to improve study skills for success in their chosen field of study

WHAT CLASSES WILL GRADUATE PATHWAY STUDENTS TAKE?

The academic courses included in the Graduate Pathway programs are carefully chosen to ensure success in graduate-level studies. Students will be advised on which modules to follow during their academic orientation at the INTO OSU Center. For sample curricula, please refer to pages 37-43.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

M.S. OR PH.D. IN COMPARATIVE HEALTH SCIENCES (CHS)

This program provides an opportunity for students to be trained in multidisciplinary approaches to investigating biological and medical problems. The CHS program offers both M.S. and Ph.D. degrees focusing on the whole animal system, particularly the use of animal models of disease.


Students enrolled in the M.S. degree will complete a total of 45 graduate credits, including 12 thesis credits. Students enrolled in the Ph.D. degree will complete a total of 108 graduate credits beyond the bachelor's or professional (Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, MD) degree.

Finding the right professor and research facility is a big decision. This program will help students find placement in a facility that matches their research goals by offering them a chance to explore several different research environments and investigators to consider for their thesis research.

This exploration takes place in the first year while they complete a core curriculum of courses such as: Research Perspectives, Methods of Data Analysis, Biomedical Ethics and more.

The core curriculum also offers choices of elective courses such as: Molecular and Cellular Biology Techniques, Introduction to Bioinformatics, Introduction to Epidemiology and more.

GRADUATE PATHWAY - COMPARATIVE HEALTH SCIENCES

The INTO OSU Graduate Pathway in Comparative Health Sciences is designed to provide a route to a research M.S. or Ph.D. in Comparative Health Sciences. The program is intended to help students with a degree in a relevant field polish their English language, research and study skills before moving on to the Comparative Health Sciences M.S. or Ph.D. program. The program is an excellent option for students with a bachelor's degree in health science who require an intermediary step between their bachelor's degree and their Master's or Ph.D.

Upon successful completion of the Pathway program, students can choose between either the Comparative Health Sciences M.S. or Ph.D. program. The Pathway classes do not count towards the degree; students are given a soft landing during their transition to the US and an accessible introduction to a broad range of fields to consider for future specialization at the graduate level.

The General English program consists of 5-week sessions designed for students of all levels of English who want to develop communication skills in a variety of social and professional situations while learning about American culture.

- Free tickets to OSU athletic events
- Use of a fully-equipped Learning Center with state-of-the-art technology

In addition, many College Year Abroad and General English students who choose shared on-campus housing are placed with American roommates, further enhancing their study abroad experience in America. With American roommates, and conversation groups/social programs organized by INTO OSU, students are more likely to have a successful experience integrating to the campus community and American lifestyle.

Study Abroad with English

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Study Abroad with English is a long-term program that combines Academic English language study with the chance to experience undergraduate courses at OSU. This unique program allows students to earn college credits in their field of interest without having to enroll in a long-term degree program. The length of the program will vary depending on a student's needs. The program can be customized for different levels of English and for specific academic interests.

With prior approval from a student's home university, the academic courses studied at OSU can be used to gain credits towards an undergraduate degree in his or her home country. Earned credits may also be applied to a degree program with admission to OSU. The program consists of two main parts:

Work and Internships

WORKING WHILE STUDYING

F-1 international students in language training programs (including Pathway programs) are not eligible for on-campus employment or practical training. Students must be in degree-seeking programs before on-campus employment or practical training is allowed.

Degree-seeking international students on F-1 visas are eligible to work on campus for up to 20 hours per week while the term is in session and are eligible to work full-time (up to 40 hours per week) between terms and during annual summer vacations.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS

Graduate students may be offered a teaching or research assistantship on campus. The assistantships are employment-based appointments where students, in exchange for their teaching or research service, receive a monthly salary, tuition remission and an institutional contribution toward the health insurance program available only to graduate assistants. Teaching and research assistantships are offered on a competitive basis and are generally administered by the academic departments.

INTERNSHIPS

Internships offer you hands-on experience working in your field and the chance to apply what you’re learning in the classroom. With the exception of students studying in intensive English programs and non-degree students, you may be eligible for curricular practical training or academic training while pursuing your studies. In most cases, any off-campus employment or internship must be related to your field of study and approved in advance by International Student Advising and Services (ISAS).

MECOP

Students can complete internships through programs like the Multiple Engineering Cooperative Program (MECOP), where they can develop employment skills and often find future jobs. The program provides the best of both worlds — the university for the technical/theoretical background and selected industries for practical, state-of-the-art applications.

WORKING AFTER GRADUATION

OSU Graduates are consistently in demand from employers such as: Boeing, HP, Intel, NVIDIA, Hitachi, Monsanto, Garmin, CH2M HILL, Google and others.

- Intel has about 800 Oregon State alumni on staff
- 60 percent of Garmin’s software engineers graduated from Oregon State’s College of Engineering
- A recent computer science graduate started an entry-level position at \$92,000 per year

Depending on the visa, students may be eligible for optional practical training or academic training programs. These programs generally provide work authorization for one year after graduation from a degree program. International Student Advising and Services offer workshops to help students understand the legal aspects of working in the United States.



Academic Resources



Academic Success Center

The Academic Success Center offers advising for undeclared majors, supplemental instruction (study tables) for some classes, study skills courses and a computer lab.



Collaborative Learning Center (CLC)

The CLC provides tutoring and one-on-one assistance. Tutors are provided by Career Services, the physics, chemistry and math departments, the Writing Center and the Valley Library.

Student Computing Facilities

Student Computing Facilities offers more than 100 Macs and PCs equipped with the latest software in an open lab setting. Scanners, color laser printing, video editing and access to over 100 computer programs are provided.

Math Learning Center

The Math Learning Center offers resource materials and free drop-in tutoring for all lower division math courses.





Valley Library




English Conversation







HOW ARE STUDENTS ASSESSED?

Assessment in a typical US university class is based on a combination of discussions and class participation, writing assignments, exams and a project presentation. A student's grade might be based on the following assignments and grade points in any given class:

Assignment	Percentage of grade	Description
Writing Assignments	10 %	There are four writing assignments. Writing assignments will consist of a 400-700 word essay discussing the topics assigned.
In-class Writings*	10 %	There are four in-class writing assignments throughout the term. These will be assigned at the instructor's discretion and are not "scheduled" assignments.
Team Discussion and Class Participation*	20 %	Throughout the term, there will be in-class discussions on various topics. Students will be assigned to teams consisting of four people who will work together during the entire course. The questions will be answered as a team.
Exams	45 %	There are a total of four exams covering key material from the course. The exams will consist of multiple-choice and short answer questions and will be completed in class.
Final Team Project	15 %	Each team will be responsible for completing a final research project and 15-minute class presentation.
Total	100 %	*The in-class writings and discussion times cannot be made up; attendance is expected. When students miss a class, it is their responsibility to get the notes from another student.

If it is determined that you are admissible to Oregon State University, OSU can provide you with an I-20 (F-1) or DS-2019 (J-1) only after you submit satisfactory evidence that you have adequate funds for your proposed program of study. Acceptable financial documents must have been issued (by the financial institution) within 3 months of the date the application was submitted with the Affidavit of Support (below) if necessary. Please refer to the following website for financial amounts required to be shown at time of application for each program: oregonstate.edu/admissions/international/applying/certification-finances. Be sure to keep copies of your financial documents as you will need to present them to the US Consular Officer at your visa interview and to the US Immigration Officers at the Port of Entry.

The following documents are not acceptable for proof of funding: stock holdings, life insurance policies, employment letters credit lines, and mortgages. Please note US visa regulations restrict student employment, and therefore, it is important not to rely on employment for income to offset your educational expenses.

Parent/Personal sponsor whose name is on financial documents must complete this portion.

Spouses, relatives, and other personal sponsors are required to complete the "Affidavit of Support" form when funds held in their name are provided as financial documentation by an international student at time of application. The affidavit of support helps confirm the legitimacy of financial documentation presented by the student.

Terms and Conditions 1 of 2

1.0 Terms and Conditions

- These are terms and conditions of the agreement between Oregon State University (the University) and the student. These terms and conditions are effective upon the payment of a deposit. These terms and conditions supersede any promises, representations and warranties, whether written or oral, made by or on behalf of the student or the University.
- Students should read these terms and conditions very carefully before submitting their application for admission.
- All students are bound by the rules, policies and procedures of the University as amended from time-to-time. These can be found at <http://oregonstate.edu/fa/manuals/gen>. The University may assign or sub-contract, in whole or in part, some or all of the benefit and/or burden of this agreement without any approval from the student.
- Definitions:

- Program (program) refers to individual courses of study. Programs offered by INTO Oregon State University include: General English (GE), Academic English (AE), Study Abroad with English (SAWE), College Year Abroad (CYA) and Pathway (PW).
- The admitted study plan (Study Plan) refers to the entirety of program(s) offered and accepted by the student at the time of admission. If the student has made multiple selections (GE, AE and PW), the Study Plan is the entire period of time needed to complete all selections.

2.0 Changes to the Terms and Conditions

- The University reserves the right to amend the terms and conditions. In such circumstances, the University will provide the student with a revised set of terms and conditions upon request. The University also makes these terms and conditions available to all students at <http://blogs.oregonstate.edu/intoos/student-services/terms-and-conditions/>

3.0 Application, Admissions, Program Offer and Deposit

- Students should complete their application and submit it to Oregon State University's International Admissions office.
- If the student is admitted, the University will issue a written offer. As described in the offer letter, in order to accept the offer, the student must sign the acceptance letter or remit a deposit payment. Remittance of the deposit denotes acceptance of the offer and of these terms and conditions.
- The deposit payment confirms the student's enrollment, housing reservation and insurance as outlined below. *The deposit is only refundable in the event that a student is unable to meet visa entry requirements, subject to the receipt of an official visa rejection letter by the published start date of the student's study-plan.*
- Where a student has selected more than one program as part of his/her study plan, the higher deposit amount will be required.
- If a student enters the US on an I-20 based with the PW program as the ultimate study goal, the student will be bound by PW program terms and conditions.

4.0 Confirmation and Full Payment

- Following the deposit payment, the remaining outstanding balance must be paid four weeks prior to the published start date of the student's study plan. Any variation to standard payment terms must be made in advance and agreed to by the University and the student in writing. Unless otherwise agreed to in writing, or if the below government sponsored student exception is met (b.), full payment must be made prior to registration.
 - If a student is applying for a scholarship from a government sponsor, the student will be required to either (i) pay in full or (ii) provide an official letter of financial guarantee from the sponsor by the end of the first week of classes for GE/CYA programs, and by the end of the second week of classes for AE/SAWE/PW programs. Students with unofficial letters of financial guarantee will be allowed to register for classes, but if the official letter of financial guarantee is not received by the deadline, students will be withdrawn from their classes and disenrolled from the INTO Oregon State University program.
 - An official letter of financial guarantee must specify that the guarantee covers the entire academic term. Sponsors will be invoiced for their portion of fees, and the student will be refunded any credit balance remaining on his/her account after payment has been received from the sponsor.
 - Sponsored students who wish to have their Oregon State University health insurance waived due to sponsor-provided coverage must comply with Oregon State University Student Health Services waiver requirements.

5.0 Overdue Payment

- In cases of overdue payment, the University reserves the right to suspend or cancel enrollment for students who do not have a pre-agreed arrangement with the University in writing for late payment, and to charge interest on the outstanding balance. Interest will be charged at the rate of 2% per month (24% APR).

6.0 Health Insurance

- The University requires non-immigrant international students to be covered by health insurance which meets the US Government's visa requirements, State of Oregon and Oregon State University requirements. Students unable to provide evidence of adequate coverage at the time of their application are required to purchase the University International Student Insurance coverage as a condition of enrollment.
 - Students who have health insurance coverage that meets or exceeds the coverage offered by the University International Student Insurance plan may request a waiver by completing the process through the University Student Health Center Insurance Office. The waiver form may be found at http://studenthealth.oregonstate.edu/sites/default/files/docs/int_waiver_form_201213.pdf.

7.0 Cancellation, Change, Withdrawal and Transfer Policies

7.1 Cancellation

- If visa entry requirements have been met, the following cancellation charges apply:
- There will be no refund of program fees, tuition, or deposits for students who cancel, withdraw, or are suspended or dismissed from any INTO Oregon State University program after the published start date.
 - Cancelling a program prior to the published start date will result in the following cancellation fees:
 - For GE, CYA: \$1,000 cancellation fee.
 - For AE, PW, SAWE: \$2,000 cancellation fee.
 - Cancellation of a program or study plan by the student includes cancellation of the International Student Insurance if the student does not remain at Oregon State University. Refunds will be made for the unexpired period of coverage minus a \$50 administrative charge. Other restrictions from the health insurance provider or Student Health Services at Oregon State University may apply. Students are advised to check directly with the Oregon State University Student Health Insurance office at 541-737-7568.

7.2 Change

- Students making a change to their study plan will be charged a \$250 administrative fee.
- Students currently enrolled in a PW Program will not receive a refund if making a program change to a lower-cost program.
- All change requests must be received two (2) weeks prior to the published program start date.

7.3 Withdrawal

- There will be no refund for students who cancel or withdraw from any INTO Oregon State University program after the published start date.
- If the student does not meet the conditions of the offer letter and the offer of admission is withdrawn, no cancellation fees will be payable by the student provided that the student informs INTO Oregon State University in writing and sends evidence that the conditions have not been met. This information must be received no later than four (4) weeks before the program start date.

7.4 Transfer

- If a student is in an INTO Oregon State University GE, CYA, SAWE or AE program and transfers to an INTO Partner School, any INTO Oregon State University tuition fees will transfer if the request is made prior to the published start date for the INTO Oregon State University program.
 - If the transfer request is made after the INTO Oregon State University program's published start date, there will be no transfer of tuition for the currently enrolled term/session, but the remaining tuition paid will be transferred to the future INTO Partner School.
- Housing cancellation fees described below will apply.
- If a student has agreed to attend an INTO Oregon State University PW program, and has begun the program, there will be no transfer of any fees.

8.0 Accommodations

- On application, students are invited to select their preferred accommodations. Accommodations are confirmed when the housing deposit is paid.
 - The University agrees to make every reasonable effort to provide the preferred accommodation type as requested. If unable to do so, the University reserves the right to provide an alternative type of accommodation, which will be charged at the published rate.
- Students living in University accommodations are required to abide by the Terms and Conditions of the Room and Dining Contract, as well as the Student Policy and Information Guide. In the case of a conflict, these Terms and Conditions will control.
- Undergraduate PW students and AE students with the intention of progressing to Undergraduate PW are required to live in University housing for the first three (3) terms of enrollment in an INTO Oregon State University program, or, an Oregon State University degree-seeking program for students in accelerated Undergraduate PW programs, unless:
 - The student is living with immediate family in a family situation (mother and/or father; legal guardian; sibling; aunt or uncle; or grandparents,) and within an approximately 30-mile radius of the Corvallis campus of Oregon State University.
 - The student has a legal dependent living with him/her.
 - The student is married or has a domestic partner.
 - The student has attended an institution of higher education as a regularly enrolled student for at least two regular semesters or three regular quarters, post high school graduation, excluding summer sessions.

- The student is living with immediate family in a family situation (mother and/or father; legal guardian; sibling; aunt or uncle; or grandparents,) and within an approximately 30-mile radius of the Corvallis campus of Oregon State University.
- The student has a legal dependent living with him/her.
- The student is married or has a domestic partner.
- The student has attended an institution of higher education as a regularly enrolled student for at least two regular semesters or three regular quarters, post high school graduation, excluding summer sessions.

Once the three-term commitment has been met, students may choose to stay in on-campus housing or to move off-campus. If the student is enrolled in the Undergraduate PW program, but chooses to cancel his/her program or housing before the three-term commitment has been met, no housing refund will be awarded.

A student seeking a waiver of the requirement to live in University housing for the reasons stated in sections i, iii, and iv above must submit a written request to the INTO Oregon State University Housing Office.

- Graduate PW students and AE students with the intention of progressing to Graduate PW are not required to live in University accommodations; however, if they would like to select University accommodations, they must agree to a three-term contract in off-campus graduate housing arranged by INTO Oregon State University, a three-term contract in a double room & shared restroom in the on-campus residence halls, or a one-term contract in homestay.
- Due to the decrease in on-campus occupancy during the Oregon State University Summer Term (June – September), the University may determine that some students need to move rooms to a new residence hall in June or in September. Move notifications will be sent during the Spring Term.

8.1 Accommodation Changes or Cancellation

- If a student has specified his/her intent to stay in University housing, the student must pay a housing deposit and the student will be responsible for housing charges for the entire term specified in his/her application form. Cancelling accommodation after payment of the INTO Oregon State University housing deposit will result in the following cancellation fees:
 - For students who cancel their on-campus housing in writing at least four (4) weeks prior to the published start date of their program or study plan, the cancellation fee will be the housing deposit.
 - For students who **do not** cancel their on-campus housing in writing at least four (4) weeks prior to the published start date of their program or study plan, the cancellation fee will be the greater of the housing deposit or the established individual daily room rate for the remainder of the housing contract.

Note: PW students who cancel their housing prior to fulfillment of the Undergraduate PW Housing Requirement (3 terms) or the Graduate PW Housing Contract will not receive any housing refund.
 - Housing waiver requests must be submitted at least four (4) weeks prior to the published start date. Waiver requests received after the 4-week deadline will be treated as cancellations.
 - Homestay Cancellation: 30-day notice is required to cancel a Homestay placement after the housing start date. For students who cancel a Homestay placement after the housing start date, the cancellation fee will be the greater of the Homestay deposit or the remainder of the 30-day notice. There is no refund of accommodation deposit if a Homestay placement is cancelled prior to the move-in date.
 - Students who are dismissed or suspended from their program, the University or University housing will be charged cancellation fees as outlined in these Terms and Conditions.
 - Students who fail to arrive without notifying INTO Oregon State University will not receive a housing refund of any kind.
 - In all cancellation scenarios, any meal plan charges exceeding the allotted amount assessed by UHDS will be charged to the student, in addition to any applicable cancellation fees.
- At the University's discretion, housing cancellation fees may be waived based on a student's petition for the following reasons:
 - The Resident completes his/her entire study plan.
 - The Resident suffers significant and/or unforeseeable financial hardships outside the Resident's reasonable control.
 - The Resident has an unforeseen and documented medical reason which requires the Resident to live off campus.
 - The Resident is unable to meet visa entry requirements, subject to the receipt of an official visa rejection letter.

If a waiver or cancellation has been requested and approved, charges will not be finalized until the resident vacates Housing. Additional charges may be incurred by the student if the facility has not been properly cleaned or there is lost/damaged property.

Terms and Conditions 2 of 2

9.0 Student Conduct

- a. Students are required to observe the policies, rules, and requirements of Oregon State University, as well as laws of municipalities and counties, the State of Oregon, and the United States of America.
- b. Students are subject to the standards of conduct as described by University rules and policies, as amended from time-to-time. Information regarding student conduct may be referenced at the following website: <http://oregonstate.edu/studentconduct/home/index.php>
- c. Failure to abide by conduct regulations and relevant laws may lead to suspension or expulsion from the University. **This may impact your immigration status, so please review the Student Conduct Code carefully.**

10.0 Appeals

- a. Students may challenge decisions through established procedures for appeals and grievances. Information on appeal procedures is available in the Student Handbook, at the International Living-Learning Center's Welcome Desk, and online via the Student Info Depot: <http://blogs.oregonstate.edu/intoosu/>, as amended from time to time.

11.0 Late Arrivals and Program Entrance Deadlines

- a. All students are expected to arrive and start their study plan on the scheduled start date. All late arrivals must be approved by INTO OSU in advance and will be considered on a case-by-case basis. No deposits, tuition, accommodation costs, or other fees will be refunded for late arrivals (and late fees may apply, as described below). Any revision of the study plan will most likely involve additional time and expenditure with regard to tuition and accommodation fees.
- b. There are strict deadlines for program entrance. An arrival after the deadline will likely result in the student being unable to attend INTO Oregon State University classes for the term, and may also require that the student return to his/her country until the next available term. Students who enter the US but cannot enroll will need to work with the University and INTO Oregon State University to arrange readmission and new visa documents.

12.0 Late Registration Fees

- a. All students who register on or after the first day of classes for the term and who do not have prior approval to register late will be assessed a \$250 Late Registration Fee.
 - i. If a student has been approved for a late arrival by International Student Advising and Services he/she will still be charged a \$250 Late Registration Fee but will have the option to submit a Registration Appeal to have the fee reversed.
- b. INTO Oregon State University Students who register late for Oregon State University classes may be assessed Oregon State University's late fees as well. <http://oregonstate.edu/registrar/pdf/OSURegistrationInformationHandbook2013-2014.pdf>, p. 37.

13.0 Airport Pick-Ups

- a. Airport shuttle service from the Portland International Airport to Corvallis is available to all newly-arriving students at no additional charge; however, reservations are required and must be made 72 hours in advance. INTO Oregon State University Arrival information may be submitted at <https://uhds.oregonstate.edu/into/arrival/information/login>.

INTO Oregon State University cannot guarantee an airport shuttle reservation if a request is made less than 72 hours in advance.

14.0 Notification of Refund

- a. Where practicable, any refunds that are due will be returned to the individual student.

15.0 Deferral of Program Start Date

- a. All requests to defer a program must be received four (4) weeks prior to the published program start date, unless in the case of a visa denial. Students may make two (2) requests to defer the program start date without penalty. Any additional deferral requests will result in a \$300 program deferral fee. An express mail fee will be charged every time express mail is used to send program documents.
- b. Students who submit deferral requests after the four-week deadline will be assessed program cancellation penalties as described above.

16.0 Academic Criteria

- a. Students are accepted into their study plan with the strict understanding that progression through the study plan and successful completion of any program are conditional upon satisfactory attendance and successful attainment of specified progression grades. During the International Student Orientation, all students will be made aware of the criteria for successful completion of the courses in their study plan. The assessment of student performance is the responsibility of the course instructor.
- b. Currently enrolled students in GE, CYA, AE, SAWE or PW programs who are planning to enter a Pathway, Conditional Admission Program (CAP), or OSU degree-seeking program must also meet the following requirements to progress:
 - i. Completion of current term enrolment in Good Attendance Standing.

- ii. Completion of current term academic program (this includes all graded Academic English classes in any level) with a grade C or better in Reading/Writing, Listening/Speaking and passing grades in elective courses.
- iii. Current enrolment must not be more than 1 language level below the desired entry level.

Note: This includes students who meet the language proficiency requirement based on a qualifying test score.

- c. Students who do not meet the criteria for successful completion will not be allowed to proceed with their original study plan. Students may be offered advice on suitable alternative study options, which may include retaking courses or changing their study plan. An alternative study plan may involve additional time and expenditure with regard to tuition and accommodation fees.
- d. Many students find it difficult to complete all requirements for an undergraduate degree in just four (4) years of study (attending only three [3] terms per year). They typically need to enroll in one (1) or more summer terms to stay on track to graduate in four (4) years.

16.1 Academic Standing

- a. Students in PW or Conditional Admission programs are subject to Oregon State University Academic Standing Regulations described at <http://catalog.oregonstate.edu/ChapterDetail.aspx?key=75#Section2890>.
- b. Please note that a student may register in no more than three (3) terms in the same AE level. Students may not repeat any Reading and Writing (R&W) or Listening and Speaking (L&S) course more than three (3) times. If an AE student does not pass an R&W or an L&S course after three (3) attempts, he/she will be academically suspended from his/her program and will not be admissible to Oregon State University (including INTO Oregon State University programs).

16.2 Attendance Standing

- a. Students in GE, FE or AE classes who fail to attend 70% of their classes in any course may be placed on Attendance Warning.
- b. If attendance in any course continues below 70% while the student is on Attendance Warning, students may be placed on Attendance Probation.
- c. If attendance in any course continues below 70% while the student is on Attendance Probation, he/she may be suspended at the end of the Probation term or session.
- d. Students who receive a suspension due to attendance standing are not admissible to Oregon State University (including INTO Oregon State University programs).

16.3 Vacation Terms

- a. Students are not eligible for a vacation term until they have completed nine (9) consecutive months of enrollment in an academic program.
- b. PW program students are not eligible for a vacation term during the first three (3) terms of PW study regardless of how many consecutive months they have already been enrolled.

16.4 Duration of Pathway Programs

- a. PW programs are designed to be completed in three (3) terms. PW study can be extended beyond three (3) terms on a term-by-term basis to a total of five (5) terms; any vacation or leave of absence terms taken after the first three (3) PW terms will be included in the 5-term PW total. Students may apply for an additional PW term beyond five (5); appeals for additional PW extension terms will be considered by an appeals committee on a case-by-case basis.

16.5 University Progression

- a. Students who meet all progression requirements for an Undergraduate PW or Graduate PW program will be permitted to progress to the appropriate degree program.

16.6 English Language and Academic Class Times and Sizes

- a. For all English language programs, classes will normally be held Monday through Friday, anytime between 8am and 8pm. Average class size is normally eighteen (18) students. Where appropriate, classes may be combined for university-style lectures.
- b. For academic programs, classes will generally be held Monday through Friday, and may be in lecture, seminar, or workshop format. Class sizes will vary, depending on the learning format (i.e., lecture, seminar, and lab).

17.0 Program Admissions Criteria

- a. Students are accepted in good faith into both English language and academic programs on the basis of the certification they provide to meet the admissions criteria. If, however, the results from the tests and assessment procedures upon arrival provide evidence that a student's actual level of English language or academic proficiency is significantly different than the one claimed and is lower than the one required for the designated program, then the student will be formally advised of the results and of applicable options. Students need to be aware that if an alternative study plan is advised, there may be a significant change in study time and expenditure with regard to tuition and accommodation fees.

- b. A student, either individually or through his/her representative, who has submitted any documentation or certification to meet the admissions criteria which is later found to have been falsified may be subject to immediate dismissal from the University.

18.0 Students Who Are Under 18

- a. For students under 18 years of age, a parent or guardian will be required to complete a medical information form, and a release of liability form. These forms will be sent to parents and the student at the time of application. No student will be allowed to enroll without these forms having been completed, signed and returned prior to the start of the program.

19.0 Student Information

- a. At the time of application, students are requested to sign a release authorizing Oregon State University to share information about the student with parents and/or representatives. It is part of the unique nature of the INTO Oregon State University program that our Center works most effectively if it can provide substantive and ongoing feedback about academic performance and/or financial issues to parents and other individuals involved in the student's success.
- b. Students may also agree in writing that their records and achievements may be used for promotional purposes without notification. Such consent will remain in effect until such agreement is withdrawn in writing.

20.0 Holidays

- a. The University is closed during most recognized U.S. holidays. Consult <http://oregonstate.edu/> for closure dates. Term dates are published in this brochure, and are based on knowledge of each program's start and end dates at the time of publication.
