Student Visa Denmark, Students Visa Requirements for Study in Denmark: Application Form, Process Procedure for Study in Denmark Visa-

Documents Required for Submitting Application

- A copy of a valid passport or other form of legitimate travel documentation issued to them.
- A passport photo. The photo must be 35 mm x 45 mm (size of head 30-36 mm from the bottom of the chin to the top of the head). They must be facing the camera directly.
- Original documentation showing that they have been accepted at an educational institution. Please note that the original letter of acceptance must be attached to the application - copies will not be accepted.
- If they have been accepted at a post-secondary educational program and have to pay a tuition fee, they must attach documentation that this has been paid for the first semester or school year.
- If student is at a basic or youth education program, prerequisite course, folk high school, or if you are a guest student at a post-secondary educational program, or any other study where they are not to pay a tuition fee, they must attach documentation that they can support themselves during their stay. The required amount is DKK 4,200 per month, and the documentation can be a bank statement, evidence of a grant or scholarship, or similar. Please note that a bank statement could come from a foreign bank, if they submit a first-time application from abroad. (However, if they are from Bangladesh, Benin, Cameroun, Ghana, India, Nepal, Nigeria, Pakistan or Togo, the bank statement must be from a Danish bank or a bank in another EU country.) If student submit a first-time application from Denmark, then the bank statement must be from a Danish bank or a bank in another EU country. The same applies if student are applying for an extension of their residence permit on the grounds that they have been accepted for a new course of study.
- If student is at a folk high school or at a basic or youth education program, they must attach documentation that applicable student fees have been paid. If student fees are to be paid in installments, subsequent to arrival in Denmark, they must attach documentation showing that they have the financial means to make these payments for the current school year.

Processing Application

When the Immigration Service has received application for a residence permit, it will evaluate it along with the enclosed documentation. In addition, the Immigration Service will check to find out if they have been reported to the Schengen Information System (SIS).

If the Immigration Service receives information that does not correspond with the information they provided, they will normally be asked to explain discrepancies before the Immigration Service rules in the case.

Once the Immigration Service has received all necessary information relating to their application, it will rule in the case.

Receive the Ruling

Immigration Service will send the ruling to the diplomatic mission where student submitted their application. The diplomatic mission will then forward it to student's home address, or request them to pick it up in person.

Processing Time

In an average, it takes about 60 days for the application to be processed.

Length of Residence Permits Granted

The duration of student residence permit depends on whether they are going to complete an entire education program, or only follow part of a program as a guest student.

If they are to complete an entire program, they will be granted a residence permit for the duration of the program.

If, on the other hand, students are only to follow part of a program, the residence permit will be granted for at maximum of two years.

It is a condition for the residence permit that students are active and enrolled in the educational program. If this is not the case, the Immigration Service can revoke their residence permit. The educational institution is obliged to inform the Immigration Service if they are not actively following the educational program

Living Expenses:-

Average monthly living expenses are estimated to be between 650-800 Euro. This includes accommodation but excludes tuition fees

Tuition Fees:-

Higher education in Denmark is usually provided free of charge for all EU/EEA students and for students who are participating in an exchange programme. All other students have to pay a tuition fee. Annual tuition fees for full-time degree students range from 6,000 to 16,000 Euro

Study in Denmark Scholarships, Scholarships for Studying in Denmark, Study in Denmark with Scholarship:

1. For full degrees or part of a degree
2. Scholarships are available for students from non-EU/EEA countries studying at higher education institutions in Denmark. The scholarships are administered by the

institutions, so please enquire about this at the institution when you apply for admission.

3. Through the Erasmus Mundus scheme, it is possible to apply for a scholarship to undertake specific Master's degree programmes offered jointly by a Danish institution and other European institutions.
4. Exchange/visiting students
 - If you are studying through an exchange agreement or as a visiting student, the possibility of obtaining financial assistance will depend on your home institution and the chosen exchange agreement:
 - If you are studying in a European country participating in the Erasmus programme, you can apply for exchange and mobility grants at your home institution.
 - If you are studying in a Nordic country and certain European countries outside the EU you can apply for grants through Nordplus and Tempus.
 - If you are studying in a country outside the EU, we would advise you to seek information about grants and scholarships at your home institution.
 - If your home country has a bilateral agreement with Denmark, it is also possible for non-Danish students and researchers to apply for a number of Danish Government scholarships.

In addition to the above mentioned opportunities, a range of other grants and scholarships are available.

Why Study in Denmark?

Denmark is the oldest monarchy in the world yet a very modern society. It is located in central Europe making it easy for people to travel anywhere in Europe using the Euro rail. The transport system is very economical in Denmark. The people even commute using bicycles as an environment friendly measure.

Danish higher education institutions welcome international researchers, teachers and students and offer high quality education programmes and research opportunities.

Denmark offers universal healthcare, free education and social security for all citizens.

Denmark is recognized for its high quality research in areas such as biotechnology and food and environmental science. The country is internationally oriented and plays an active role in global business and politics.

The international students being a foreign national are required to have a residence permit to be eligible to continue their education in any educational institution of Denmark.

In order to be granted a residence permit student must document:

- That they have been admitted to a higher educational program which has been approved by a state authority or which is offered by a publicly accredited institute of learning.
- That student can support themselves for the duration of their stay in Denmark. If they are to pay a tuition fee, they must document that they have paid the tuition fee for the first semester or year, instead of documenting that they can support themselves.
- That student can speak and understand the language of instruction and have a working knowledge of Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, English or German.

Student's participation in the educational program must have been arranged by a ministry or institution of higher learning or the educational program must be part of a post-secondary educational program which they have already commenced in their country of origin. In other words, they may be granted a residence permit either in order to complete an entire educational program or in order to follow part of a program as a guest student.

Normally, student must have obtained a residence permit before entering Denmark. They can submit their application in their country of origin (or in the country where they have resided permanently for the past three months). Students are required to submit their application at the Danish diplomatic mission (embassy or consulate general) in their country of origin.

Higher educational programmes

You can be granted a residence permit in order to follow a **higher educational programme** in Denmark.

If you are a **Nordic citizen**, you are free to reside, study and work in Denmark. If you are an **EU/EEA citizen** or Swiss citizen seeking residence in Denmark based on the EU rules on freedom of movement, you may be subject to special regulations. More information about EU/EEA and Nordic citizens.

Conditions

In order to be granted a residence permit you must document:

- That you have been admitted to a higher educational programme which has been approved by a state authority or which is offered by a publicly accredited educational institution.
- That you can support yourself with your own means for the duration of your stay in Denmark. If you are to pay a tuition fee, you must document that you have paid the tuition fee for the first semester or year, instead of documenting that you can support yourself. Please note that a foreign student in Denmark may not receive public assistance / benefit payments. If you do so, your residence permit can be revoked.
- That you can speak and understand the language of instruction and have a working knowledge of either Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, English or German.

Your participation in the educational programme must have been arranged by a ministry or institution of higher learning, **or** the educational programme must be part of a higher educational programme which you have already commenced in your country of origin. In

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What is a higher educational programme?

Normally, the term 'higher educational programme' is used when the conditions for admission into the programme require you to have completed upper secondary school or the equivalent.

If the educational programme is included in the Ministry of Education's coordinated application system for admission to higher educational programmes, then the programme will normally be regarded as 'higher' in connection with the application for a residence permit. You can find more information about higher educational programmes on the website of the Ministry of Education and on the website of the Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovation.

Admission as a single-subject student or similar, or admission as a student under an Open University programme is **not** generally regarded as admission to a higher educational programme. The same applies to language classes at a language centre, a municipal language school or similar institution.

Preparatory higher educational programmes

In some cases, the Immigration Service may grant you a residence permit for a preparatory course to a higher educational programme. The following conditions apply:

- The Ministry of Education must have determined that participation in the preparatory course is an admission requirement in order to follow the higher educational programme.
- You must already have been accepted at the educational programme to which the preparatory course is connected.
- The duration of the preparatory course must be no more than one year.

Duration

The duration of your residence permit depends on whether you are going to complete an entire educational programme, or only follow part of a programme as a guest student.

If you are to complete an entire programme you will be granted a residence permit for the duration of the programme.

If, on the other hand, you are only to follow part of a programme, the residence permit will be granted for the duration of the part you are to follow.

If you are to follow a preparatory course, your residence permit will be granted for the duration of the course.

It is a condition for the residence permit that you are active and enrolled in the educational programme. If this is not the case, the Immigration Service can revoke your residence permit. The educational institution is obliged to inform the Immigration Service if you are not actively following the educational programme.

Greencard scheme for students

If you have been granted a residence permit in order to complete a higher educational programme in Denmark, your residence permit will be valid for an additional six months after you complete the programme. This is to allow you to look for work in Denmark.

If you complete a higher educational programme in Denmark and you have not previously been granted the additional six months' residence permit, you can have your residence permit **extended** by six months in order to look for work. This is done by submitting an application for extension.

Family members

If you have been granted a residence permit to follow a higher educational programme, then your spouse, registered partner or cohabiting partner, as well as any children under the age of 18 who are living at home with you, are also eligible for residence permits. However, you must document that you have at your disposal the equivalent of DKK 25,000 per family member, your family members must be able to support themselves, and you must live together in Denmark at the same address. Your spouse, registered partner or cohabiting partner is allowed to work full-time for the entire period his or her residence permit is valid.

You are not entitled to family reunification during the job-seeking period after the completion of the educational programme. However, if you have already brought your family to Denmark, then they are allowed to stay for the additional six months. The conditions mentioned above still apply during this period.

Work

As a foreign student following a higher educational programme or a required preparatory course which is approved by the Ministry of Education, you are allowed to work 15 hours a week, as well as full-time during the months of June, July and August. The same applies during the job-seeking period after the completion of your educational programme. A work permit sticker will be placed in your passport.

If you are under the age of 18, you are only eligible for a work permit if you have a written offer or contract for a specific position, and if the employer confirms to the Immigration Service that workplace environment legislation is upheld.

If you work illegally in Denmark, e.g. by working more than the allowed number of hours, the Immigration Service may revoke or refuse to extend your residence permit. This can happen even if you otherwise meet the conditions for your residence permit, e.g. if you are still actively enrolled in your course or study programme.

If you work illegally in Denmark, you risk deportation, and you and your employer risk fine or imprisonment

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- That you can speak and understand the language of instruction and have a working knowledge of either Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, English or German.

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
